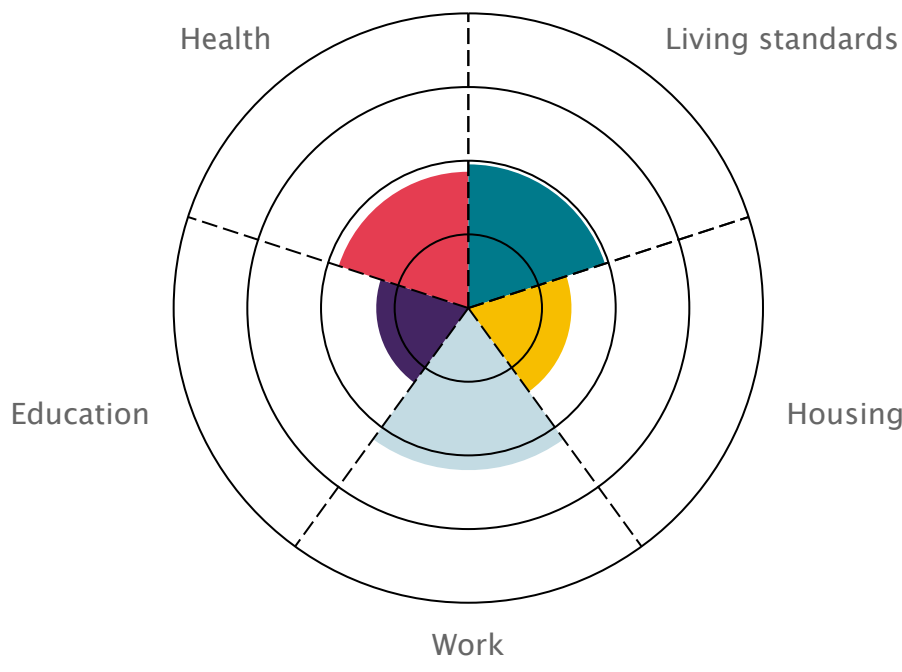

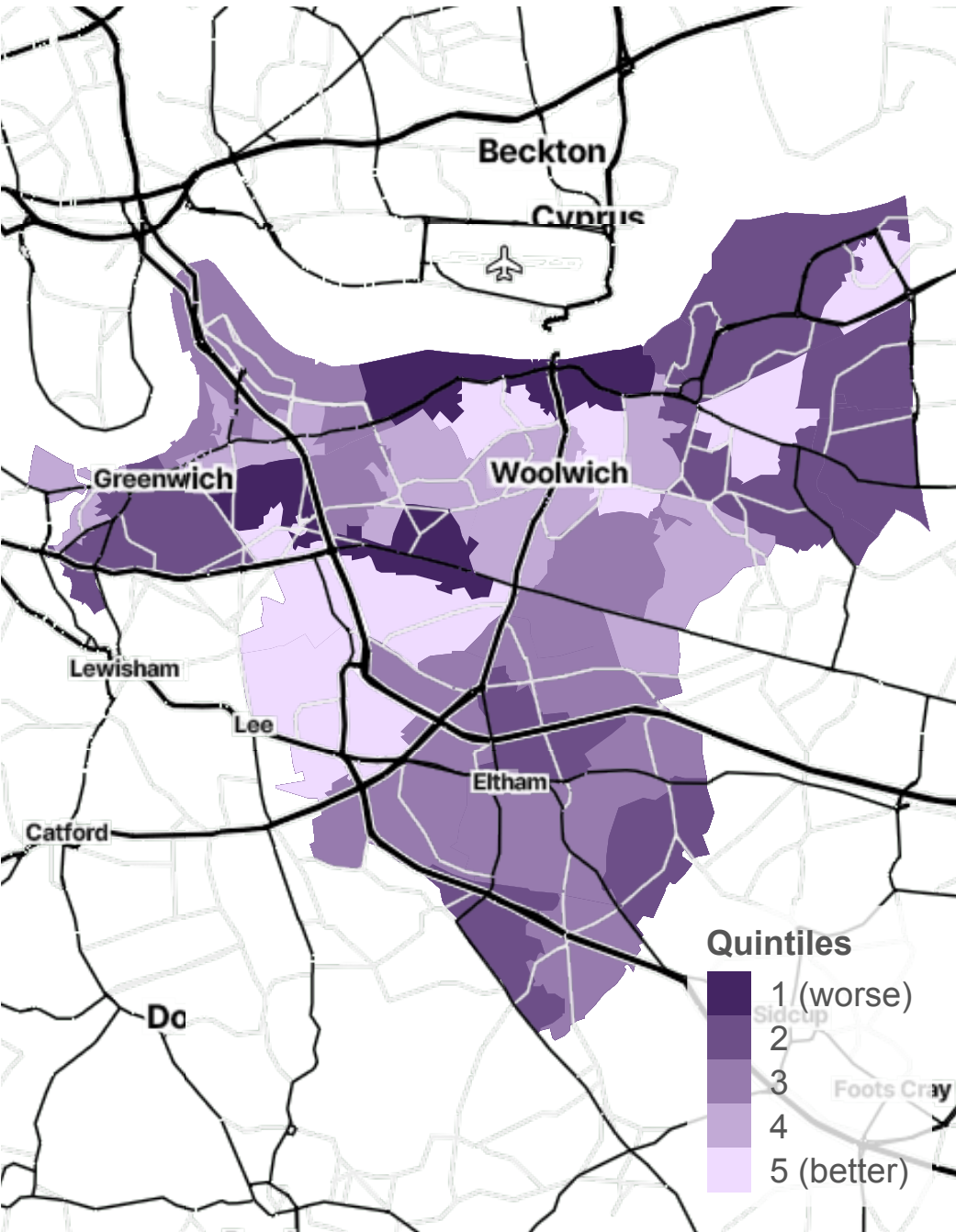


The chart above summarises the boroughs' indicators across each of our themes. The center represents worse performance, outer rings better

Key Points

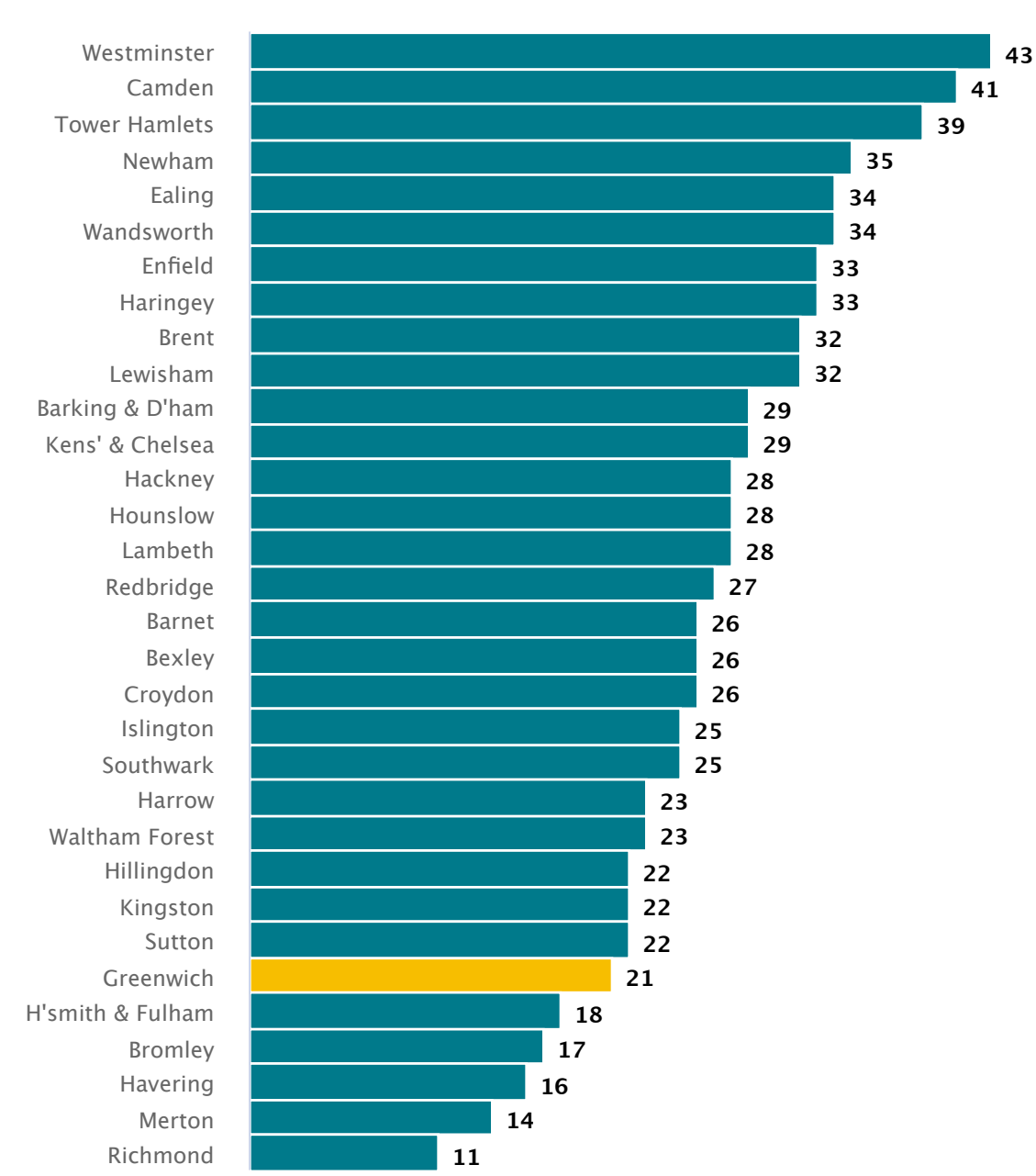
- In 2021/22, 21% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- 36% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- In Greenwich, 14.2% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2023. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- Unemployment change in 2023 Q3 at -0.7 percentage points from 3 years ago was better than the average London Borough.
- There were 3.75 repossessions by county court bailiffs per 1,000 in Greenwich in 2022 Q4 - 2023 Q3, worse than the average London Borough.
- Greenwich owed 1.33 per 1,000 households a main homelessness duty in 2023 Q1, worse than the average London Borough.

Income estimates 2018



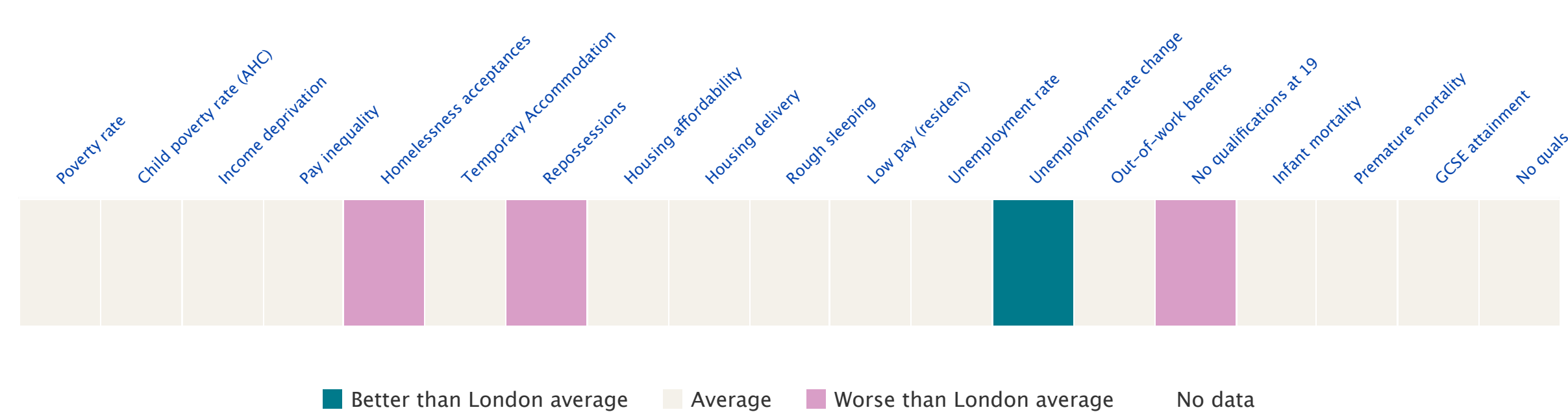

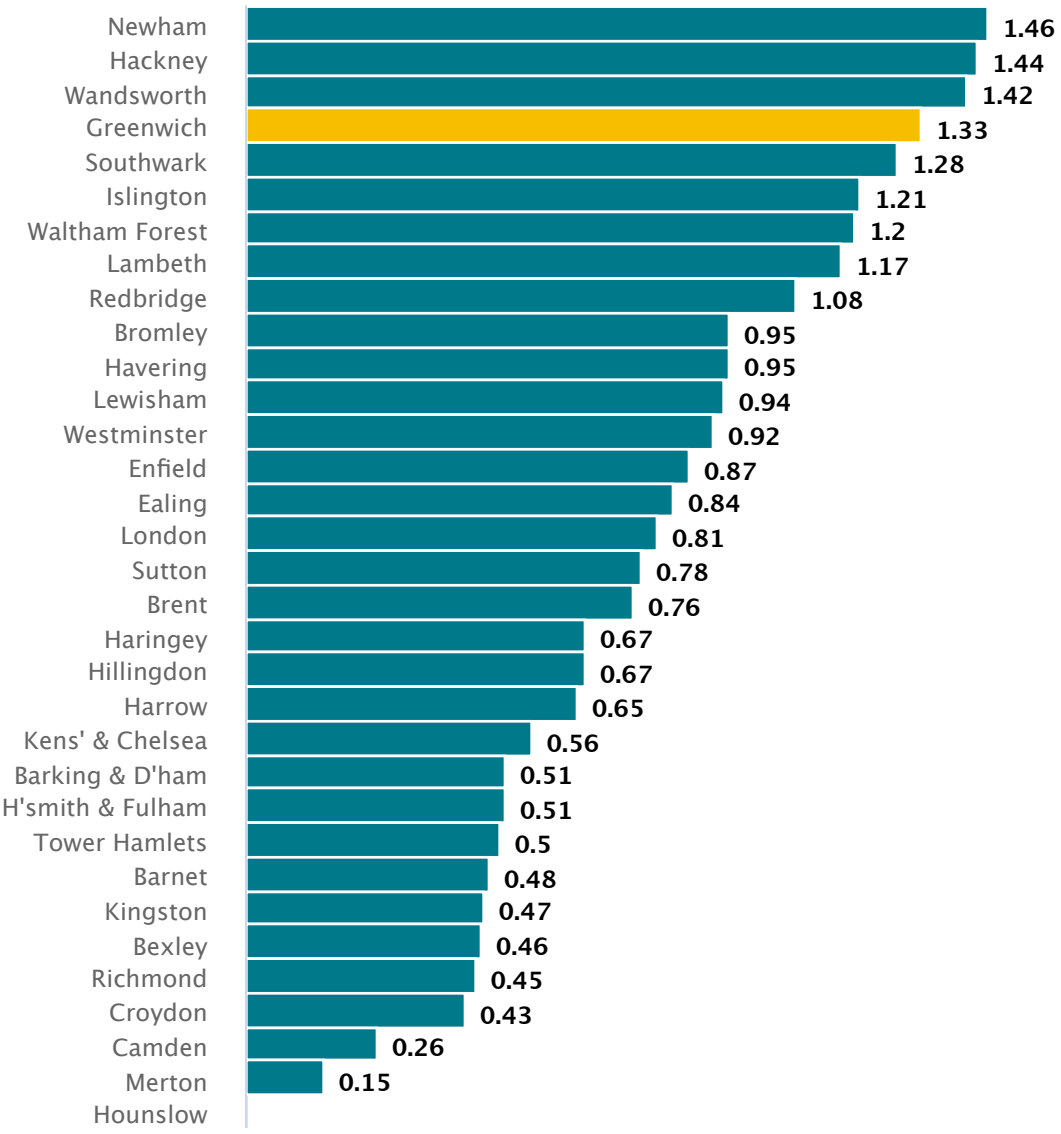
Greenwich ratings across key indicators

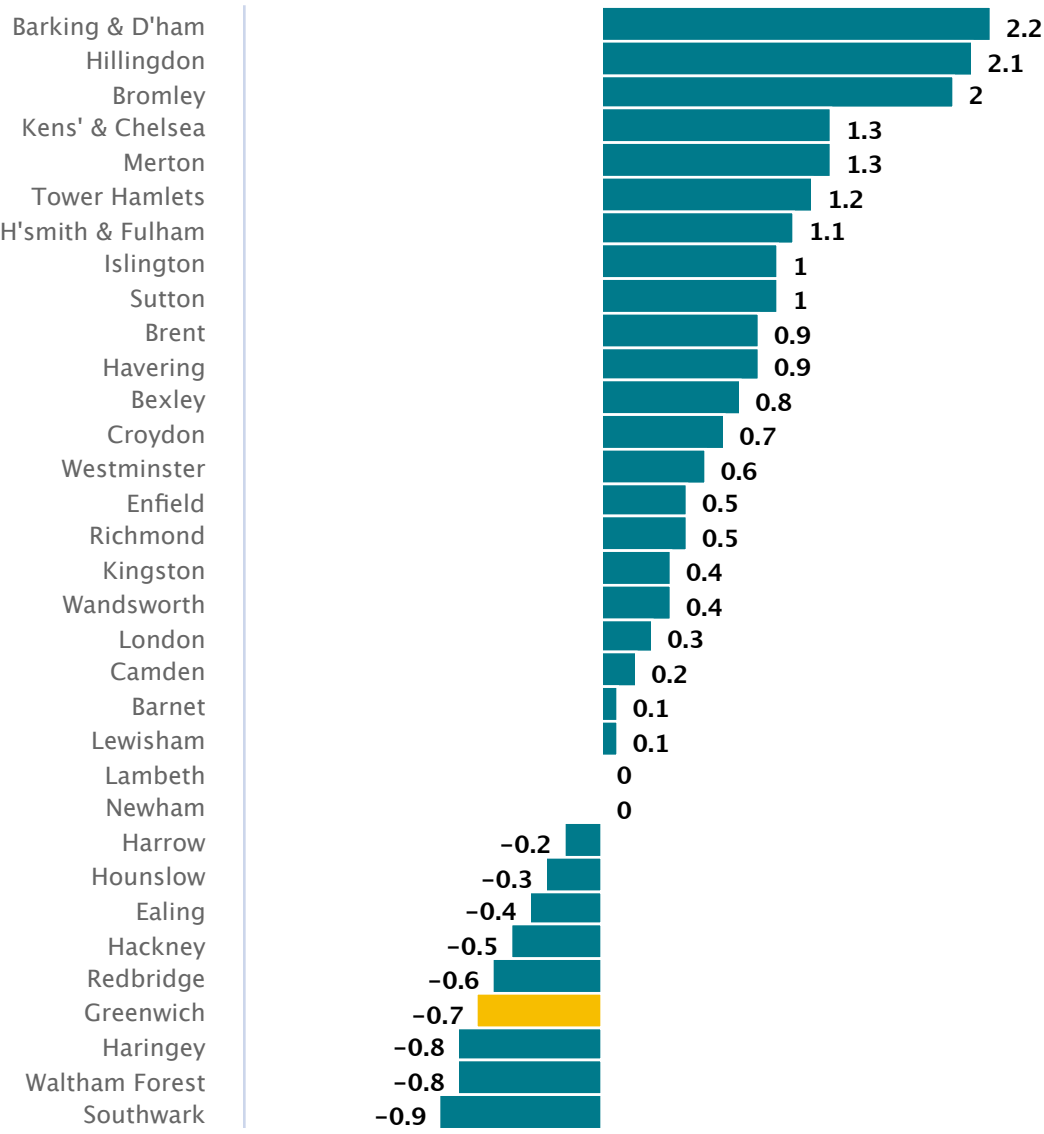
Main homelessness duty owed per 1,000 households 2023 Q1
