




The chart above summarises the boroughs' indicators across each of our themes. The center represents worse performance, outer rings better

#### **Key Points**


- In 2021/22, 26% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- 25% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- In Barnet, 18.9% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2023. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- GCSE attainment was better than the average London Borough in Barnet, with 80.5% of students achieving grades 9-4 (A\*-C under the old grading system) in GCSE English and Maths in 2021/22
- The proportion of 19-year-olds without a level 2 or level 3 qualification in 2021/22 was 21.7%, better than the average London Borough
- The unemployment rate for 2023 Q3 was 5.5% in Barnet, around the same as the average London Borough.


### Barnet ratings across key indicators
