
Barnet

Key Points

• In 2021/22, 26% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was around the same as the average London Borough.

• 25% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was around the same as the average London Borough.


• In Barnet, 18.9% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2023. This was around the same as the average London Borough.

• The proportion of 19-year-olds without a level 2 or level 3 qualification in 2021/22 was 21.7%, better than the average London Borough


• GCSE attainment was better than the average London Borough in Barnet, with 80.1% of students achieving grades 9-4 (A*-C under the old grading system) in GCSE English and Maths in 2022/23

• 6.9% of adults in the borough had no recognised qualifications in 2021. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
