






The chart above summarises the boroughs' indicators across each of our themes. The center represents worse performance, outer rings better

#### **Key Points**


- In 2021/22, 26% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- 26% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- In Bexley, 16.7% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2023. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- Pay inequality as measured by the ratio of wages at the 80th percentile to the 20th percentile in 2023 was better than the average London Borough at (2.29).
- Average rent for a one-bedroom house or flat on the private market was at least 33.2 percent of median pre-tax pay in London in October 2022 to September 2023. This was better than the average London Borough.
- GCSE attainment was worse than the average London Borough in Bexley, with 69.4% of students achieving grades 9-4 (A\*-C under the old grading system) in GCSE English and Maths in 2022/23
- Infant mortality rates per 1,000 live births in Bexley were worse than the average London Borough at 6 in 2019-21

## Income estimates 2020





### Bexley ratings across key indicators




