
Hammersmith and Fulham

Key Points

• In 2021/22, 18% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was better than the average London Borough.

• 28% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was around the same as the average London Borough.

• In Hammersmith and Fulham, 9.9% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2023. This was better than the average London Borough.

• Average rent for a one-bedroom house or flat on the private market was at least 53.1 percent of median pre-tax pay in London in October 2022 to September 2023. This was around the same as the average London Borough.


• Infant mortality rates per 1,000 live births in Hammersmith and Fulham were worse than the average London Borough at 6.1 in 2019-21




